Indiana University **August 2015-Present**
Visiting Clinical Associate Professor and Dean's Fellow for the Intersection of Business and Government – Teach Ethics courses for the Kelley School of Business and the School of Public and Environmental Affairs. Also Serve as Chair of the Indiana Business Research Center Task Force. In the 2015-2016 academic year served as adjunct faculty member.

Board Chair and C.E.O. – Served as Board Chair and Chief Executive Officer of the prudential regulatory agency charged with ensuring the safety and soundness of the Farm Credit System, a network of cooperatively-owned lending institutions responsible for approximately forty per cent of farm lending in the United States. In this President-appointed, Senate-confirmed position, successfully led the agency to adopt rules, regulations, and policies to strengthen the Farm Credit System. Also led the agency to adopt formal policy strengthening its own ethics and arm's-length requirements. Served as a Board Member from March 2010-November 2012.

Adjunct Faculty – Taught Graduate School course on public policy and the global economy. Also prepared for the College of Business a survey and report on sustainability programs offered by colleges and universities in the United States.

Headed up the conversion of the rural home loan servicing operation that led to the lowest delinquency rate in the program's history. Also served as Chair of the Rural Telephone Bank Board of Directors and served as a Member of the Commodity Credit Corporation Board.

Fellow, Institute of Politics, Kennedy School of Government – Developed and taught a Study Group on Agriculture and Rural Policy and advised students on politics and political science.

Selected Professional Works

As Board Chair and C.E.O. of the Farm Credit Administration, led the Agency to: approve a proposed rule governing Farm Credit System compensation disclosures to shareholders and investors; approve inter-agency rule-making to implement Dodd-Frank Act directives for establishing margin and capital requirements for Farm Credit System institutions that engage in non-cleared swaps and non-cleared security-based swap transactions; to approve a proposed capital rule consistent with Basel III, and to approve a final rule on Farm Credit System liquidity reserve requirements. As a Board Member, prior to being named Chair and CEO, led a significant and sustained effort to clarify and strengthen the Arm's-Length role as a prudential regulator, resulting in significant revisions to the Farm Credit Administration PS-81. Delivered the keynote, "Agriculture and the Rural Economy" at the Annual Agriculture Conference of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, November 17, 2014.

As Chief Executive Officer at the National Center for Food and Agricultural Policy, oversaw a number of projects, including the following research and policy workshops: 1. "Rural Communities: The Challenge of Meeting Veterans' Needs," 2. "Growing Up and Growing Old in Rural America," 3. "High-Speed Internet in Rural America," 4. "Health and Well-Being in Rural America." Also co-authored research on the impact proposed Social Security reforms would have on the rural economy.
